A NOTE FROM RABBI DAVE ROTENBERG, DIRECTOR, NCSY OTTAWA, NCSY CANADA

It's 2am on a Sunday morning last spring, and Ottawa's Glaubach Fellows have just helped me pull off a fantastic but exhausting weekend of programming. As I finally get ready for bed, my phone buzzes with a notification from our group chat. "Jew's harp concert in Rabbi Dave's basement!" the text reads. Apparently, the two young men staying at my place want to keep the party going, and from the texts that follow, it's clear that the two young ladies sleeping elsewhere in the neighbourhood wish they could join in. I chuckle to myself when I realise that NCSY Canada's Head of Advisors and the Director of the Shevet Glaubach Fellowship, both also members of the group chat, must have zero clue what's going on - a fact that sends the Fellows into hysterics when I point it out the next morning. And it is this kind of humour and camaraderie that both exemplified Year 1 of the SGF in Ottawa, and got this year's cohort (including one returning Fellow) as fired up as conceivably possible for Year 2.

After davening, we enjoyed a tasty Shabbos lunch filled with beautiful singing, followed by an informative guest presentation from Allied Voices for Israel, on combatting antisemitism and anti-Israel sentiment in our schools and communities.

Ottawa is a wonderful small community, and our NCSY operation has been growing significantly over the last number of years. While our staff team has grown this year, we currently only have one local advisor. This has made our chapter an ideal fit with the Shevet Glaubach Fellowship. In addition to their invaluable presence on these Ottawa mini-Shabbatons, the Fellows have been matched up with Ottawa teens on regional Shabbatons, continuing to build those relationships in between visits. The Fellows have also enabled us to offer remote alumni learning, chavrusa opportunities for teens with specific interests or unavailable on the

nights of our in-person Learn & Earn, and have even been working on a Shabbos Candle-lighting initiative for girls.

Before we put a wrap on another successful year, a large group of Ottawa teens is looking forward to connecting with our Fellows on our upcoming Spring Regional, and plans are in the works for one additional visit for our end-of-year "Shabbattawa Weekend".

Whether it's for a regional Shabbaton, local programming, ongoing one-on-one support for our teens, or even just connecting with our local staff for a post-program debrief featuring late-night nachos, video games, or music, the Shevet Glaubach Fellowship has been a wonderful enhancement to NCSY in Ottawa. As an ambitious and often overwhelmed City Director, I am grateful to my wonderful fellows, our partners at NCSY Canada's head office, the SGF staff, and of course, the Glaubach Family, for making this tremendous initiative a reality.
