## SGF SPOTLIGHT ON SOUTHWEST BY: SECOND YEAR FELLOW, MOSHE BENHAMU FROM BROOKLYN. NY



I had the privilege to be on a Southwest SHabbaton in Broken Bow, Oklahoma on January 27th. After a 3 hour bus ride from Dallas, Texas, we arrived in style at two lakeside cabins where we frantically unloaded the bus and organized the houses. In typical Southwest fashion, it was a chaotic buildup of "Whos sleeping where" and "how many mattresses are we lugging to the boys house", before all getting together for a peaceful half hour of pictures and pre-shabbat Kugel. musical Kabbalat Shabbat on the porch of the house signaled probably the first time any Jewish prayers were sung in Broken Bow. After a meal filled with food and diver Torah by both an advisor and the Dallas NCSY President, we began our first learning session.

Parashat Beshalach is famous for the episode of the Splitting of the Sea, but it has 5 other tough situations that B'nei Israel were presented with. The advisors each prepared a modern day dilemma to discuss that mirrored a dilemma the Jews in the desert had to face. We had a conversation about the actual response to these dilemmas vs the proper responses. This started off in earnest the theme of the Shabbaton which was Resilience. An oneg and some games rounded out Friday night as we headed to sleep, eagerly awaiting the next day.

I awoke to the sound of French being yelled in the kitchen. Little did I know. but one of our teens is a foreign exchange student from France, while another grew up in Belgium. So there I was in Oklahoma. the heart of USA, waking up to two people speaking French about what to have for breakfast. We walked over to the girls house and prayed Shacharit outside overlooking the lake, and went inside for Musaf. It was almost like the house was built for tefillah. The songs and tunes of Musaf echoed off the walls as our voices reverberated through the house. It was really one of the most fun and inspiring tefillot I've had in NCSY.

We had our second advisor sessions, this one more up to the advisor to lead, and many of us spoke about the connection between Amalek the Parsha and the in current war with Hamas. The afternoon consisted of games, schmoozing, optional shiurim, and the patented, obligatory Dallas NCSY Nature Walk. Ebbing was led by Rabbi Lomner and one of the teens who has a cousin as a hostage in Gaza spoke to us about resiliency. The director of Dallas got up afterwards and shared her own story, and with emotions peaked, we cried out the song "Shema Israel" which speaks about the quest to reignite the spirit in Jewish Children after the Holocaust: A tale of resiliency like no other. After lifting our hearts and shedding quite a few tears together, we sang havdala and went to go change out of our shabbat clothes.

Motzei Shabbat highlighted by glow-in-thedark capture the flag in the woods, followed by a lakeside bonfire with hotdogs, smokes, guitars, and singing. The next morning kept the atmosphere, all of us praying outside in Hashem's beautiful nature all together, showing the world that we are here, we are proud, we are fighting, and we are eternal.
